- 2. Introduction of visitors or first timers: 6 new visitors shared their locations and experiences. Note: Alonzo B. from Federal Bug Investigators (818) 293-7378 visited meeting and offered to work with beekeepers when he gets calls for eradication. Interested members can contact him.
- 3. Thank Doug Noland for the treat du jour. Thanks to Albert for helping with the raffle.
- 4. First/Second year beekeeping

Cindy Gates provided a fireside chat about her first two years. She shared the problems with mites and how she wasn't checking often enough for varroa. The second year (even though she was being diligent), she had a terrible August with high mite count. Keith at Valley Hive assisted her and they split the hives and treated. She also had problems this year with queen loss and had to requeen three hives. Caught two hives in her yard but they were hot and aggressive and had to be put down. Also shared her experiences with pesticide poisoning this year. Also had tons of small hive larva.

5. Honey Harvest Festival.

Need 20 beekeepers a day. Club and Festival will incentivize with packages.

6. Topic Speaker:

Michele Colopy is the program director for the Pollinator Stewardship Council whose mission is to defend managed and native pollinators vital to a sustainable and affordable food supply from the adverse impact of pesticides.

She addressed migratory beekeeping and why keeping bees alive is so difficult. Nature of massive beekeepers coming to one area, poor nutrition with one crop, pesticides and herbicides. California is the only state tracking pesticide applications (50 pesticides herbicides, fungicides, and adjuvants being used on almonds, apples, cherries, alfalfa, clover, sunflowers. blueberries, cranberries, watermelons,

cantaloupes, pumpkins, citrus). A sampling of California's surface water system revealed a 59% level with neonicatoids. Defined neonicotinoids: Any of a class of broad spectrum insecticides acting like nicotine. Encouraged members to go to websites to see the manufacture data sheets with full cautions and warnings. Warnings about tank mixes. Agricultural drift had a big impact on organic fields.

Other notes:

Pesticides on seeds are not regulated.

Discussed the impact of Glyphosate on honey bees. Beekeepers rarely compensated for losses. Research Dept of Agriculture on how to prevent bee poisonings:

- Avoid spraying crops when they are in bloom
- Return to true IPM
- Support regenerative methods in farming
- READ LABELS
- Support Beneficial insects
- prevent west nile virus by emptying still waters around the yard
- Note: Ortho responded to remove neonics
