4. Speaker: Erin Johnson, Director of Outreach Theodore Payne Foundation

Education and Advocacy organization for native plants, (Speaker) provided a history of Theodore Payne and the organization. Highlights includes the Seed program which includes 700 species of seeds; propagation nursery (75,000 plants grown on site; retail nursery for native plants with over 900 species and cultivars, and their Adult education program; seed shop, bookshop and art gallery, fire demonstration garden, Festivals and public talks throughout the region. K-12 Education program (field trips and site visits/plantings) Involved in helping communities plant public places with native gardens.

Native Plant Garden Tour: April 6 and 7. Self guided journey through 29 gardens.
